First Nation Land Management (FNLM) - History

- In 1991, a group of First Nations Chiefs approached Canada with a proposal to enable First Nations to opt-out of 44 sections of the *Indian Act* related to land & environmental management
- Led to the signing of the Framework
 Agreement on First Nation Land
 Management between Canada and 14
 First Nations in 1996
- There are currently 159 active First Nation signatories to the Framework Agreement across Canada

What is FNLM?

First Nations-led initiative that shifts control over land administration from ISC to Nations

Operational First Nations can:

- Opt out of the 44 sections of the Indian Act related to land management (replaced with their own Land Code)
- Gain authority to establish their own land, resource and environment management laws & processes
- Exercise enforcement powers
- Collect rent revenues directly
- Operate at the speed of business



Key Features of FNLM


- The lands remain reserve lands
- The existing *Indian Act* lands processes are no longer applicable. Nation can develop their own "designation" & permitting processes.
- Does not affect other ISC programs, grants or obligations (except RLEMP)
- Lands added to reserve can also fall under FNLM
- Nation can develop their own environmental review process or choose to retain the existing federal process
- Economic Development:
 - Studies found that operational Nations can approve economic development projects at a pace comparable to those off-reserve
 - FNLM contributes to job creation, higher incomes, and more investment on reserves
- FNLM is not:
 - x Termination of right and title
 - x Fee simple
 - x A government program

FNLM: Main Stages

Interested First Nations	 Info available from ISC Regional Office or the FNLM Resource Centre Pass a BCR to become a signatory to the Framework Agreement No deadline
Developmental First Nations	 Signs the Developmental Phase Funding Agreement Receive milestone-based funding to develop an Individual Agreement with Canada; a Land Code; and a community ratification process Up to 2 years
Community Ratification	 The vote process is developed and administered by the Nation E-voting is available
Operational First Nations	 The Individual Agreement is signed & the Land Code comes into force Receive on-going funding based on a funding formula re-negotiated every 5 years Newly Operational Nations receive 2 years of additional transitional funding



Currently 159 active Nations





Canada

- Lands Advisory Board (LAB) is a political body comprised of Chiefs from operational Nations
- First Nations Land Management Resource Centre (RC) is a co-facilitator of FNLM and the technical arm of the LAB
- **ISC Headquarters** is responsible for national policy coordination, financial management, and support
- ISC Regional Offices are co-facilitators of FNLM and the point of contact for many Nations
- Natural Resources Canada provides technical expertise in surveys and land descriptions for reserves

What is RLEMP?

- Funding program for First Nations to establish or strengthen their lands department, and develop capacity in:
 - Lands Administration & Management
 - Community Land Use Planning
 - Environmental Management
 - Compliance with Policy and Legislation
- Can be a pre-cursor to FNLM (optional)



Strengthen First Nation land management



Provide funding for Nation land managers to become certified, and establish or strengthen a lands department



Increase First Nation involvement in land and environmental activities on reserve, subject to the *Indian Act*



Increase capacity and FNLM readiness (optional)

RLEMP Funding


Funding formula considers:

- Population and land base
- Type, volume and complexity of land and natural resource interests (*Indian Act* permits, leases etc.)
- Operational costs
- Environmental and compliance activities
- Level of responsibility
- Registered land and natural resource transactions


Funding and RLEMP Levels

 Land manager certified by National Aboriginal Land Managers Association (NALMA)
- Nation is actively managing reserve lands, natural resources and environment under the <i>Indian Act</i>
 ISC no longer initiating land instruments but retaining signing function
 Obtain further lands management and signing authority under sections 53/60 of the <i>Indian Act</i> Nation is performing all lands, natural resources and environment management and performing signing function
